

As we all begin to celebrate the holidays and settle in to endure the cold season, don't forget to appreciate the unique wonders of winter. No matter how you personally feel about the white stuff, the cold and snow of winter play important ecological roles in nature. Many plants and insects go dormant, taking a break from growing to conserve energy and prevent damage from freezing temperatures. A cold blanket of snow helps recharge the water table, insulates the ground, and can provide necessary cover for prey animals. In fact, how animals instinctively respond to the upcoming winter season is fascinating in itself. Some wildlife migrate, some hibernate, some change color, some grow more fat and fur, some stash food, some create their own antifreeze... they've all come up with their own impressive adaptations to deal with cold, dark winters. Don't forget that although frigid temperatures feel unpleasant, the quick onset of cold can help kill ticks too!



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And even though most of us want to cozy up indoors with a hot beverage, cold temperatures can benefit our bodies and minds too. Exposure to cold decreases inflammation and can activate metabolism in adults, while shivering stimulates the burning of fat in our bodies. The cold can boost sleep quality and can also help us overcome mental habits, improve focus, and boost creativity. People also tend to reconnect with the people who matter most to us during the wintertime.

With all that being said, Kettle Creek is here to help facilitate your winter enjoyment! In addition to several outdoor family programs like wildlife tracking in the snow, wilderness survival, and full moon walks, we are also offering a full-day immersive winter experience during the holiday break!

#### Kettle Creek Environmental Fund Update

Over three decades ago a group of citizens in Monroe County came together to establish a 501(c)3 non-profit fundraising organization to help the Monroe County Conservation District carry out its mission, especially regarding environmental education of our children, youth, and adults in our area.

During its existence the Kettle Creek Environmental Fund (KCEF) has raised over \$1 million to that end. Those monies have been used to help

construct the Kettle Creek Environmental Education Center, to purchase a 13-passenger accessible bus for trips, to support special programs like the Envirothon and Conservation Camp, to help all four Monroe County school districts provide EE for their students, and other projects as well.

All of these endeavors have been possible due to one thing—your generosity as supporters of KCEF. Over the years many of you have made donations and attended our dinners with regularity. Some of you are new to the area and just beginning to learn about the center and our fundraising organization—we thank all of you for helping to make our recent fundraising dinner a huge success. Attendance at the dinner topped 180 and our net income from dinner tickets, games and raffles, donations, and dinner sponsors was over \$25,400. These donations will be added to our existing funds to continue to provide ongoing EE programs, to develop new EE programs, and to fund special projects that are being proposed.

Sadly, our 2023 fundraising dinner would be the last one for KCEF's longest running board member, John Woodling. John passed away October 10th. John had been a board member since 1993 and served as

President of the Board for the last 15 years. During the 2022 fundraising dinner, the KCEF Board provided a special commendation to John for his 30 years of service to KCEF. We loved and respected John and will miss him very much.

Donations to the Kettle Creek Environmental Fund may be made in memory of John and will be used to fund a special project in his memory.

# Unlocking the Mystery: Why Birds Shy Away from Your Feeders

If birds aren't coming to your bird feeders, there could be several reasons why they are staying away.

First, consider the location of your feeders. Birds prefer a safe and open spot where they can easily spot potential predators. If your feeders are too close to shrubs or bushes, birds may feel exposed and avoid them. Also, check for any noisy or active areas around your home that might be scaring the birds away, such as loud machinery or pets.

Another reason might be the type of food you're offering. Birds have diverse dietary preferences, so it's essential to provide a variety of seeds and feed. Common options include sunflower seeds, nyjer seeds, millet, and suet. Make sure your feeders are clean and free from mold or spoiled food, as birds are cautious about their health and will avoid contaminated sources.

To attract more birds this winter, you can take several steps. First, create a bird-friendly environment by planting native trees and shrubs that provide natural food sources and shelter. Additionally, adding water sources like a birdbath can be inviting, especially when other water sources are frozen. Regularly maintaining and cleaning your feeders, ensuring they are well-stocked, and offering a range of bird food options will make your yard more appealing to a variety of bird species. Patience is key, as it may take some time for the birds to discover and become accustomed to your feeding station. Over time, with the right conditions and offerings, you'll likely see more feathered visitors to your bird feeders.

# **Project Feederwatch Update**



Project FeederWatch is off to a great start this season with our dedicated volunteers spending roughly 15 cumulative hours biweekly observing our feeders. Project FeederWatch is an important citizen science project that provides valuable information to the Cornell Lab of Ornithology about bird populations and distribution. So far this season we have observed 15 bird species at our feeders, as well as mammals such as chipmunks and squirrels.

This year, Project FeederWatch has added some new interesting components to its data collection including mammal counts, disease or mortality counts, notes on any site changes, as well as asking participants to record their personal emotions while observing the feeders. Participants have the option to take note of how they were feeling while watching birds, mammals, or any sick or dead birds that may have been encountered. The range of emotions includes angry, surprised, sad, neutral, excited, happy, and love it. The goal of this new component is to

### A Mysterious Project Owlnet Season

Project Owlnet 2023 was one we'll remember for a long time, not because of how many owls we encountered but how *few*. The nets opened for the season the first week of October and remained guiet for two weeks, including the first open house of

the season at Kettle Creek.

Eventually owls began to show up and participants at the second and third open houses got to see these cute little owls, many of them for the first time.

The timing of the migration was later than usual and there were very few HY (hatch year) birds among those we banded. In the end we banded a total of 15 saw-whet owls. We also

did not encounter any

owls that were already banded. We still need to sift through the data from other locations, the late season push did raise totals for many stations across the mid Atlantic region. To what extent the massive wildfires in Canada this past summer had on the breeding cycle and timing of this years migration we may not fully understand for some time. It will be interesting to see how this season compares with the seasons that follow.
